Some sounds (phonemes) are represented by more than one letter (grapheme) - C-H says /ch/, S-H says /sh/, T-H says /th/ and N-G says /ng).

Introducing sounds instructions

- 1. {Hold up phoneme card} We are learning the sound _. Say _.

- 3. {Hold up the letter tracing card, with letters outlined} This is the letter symbol we write for the sound _ and we call this _ {say letter name}. Trace this with your finger. Start here. {point to number 1 dot on card}
- 4. This is the sound _. Say _.

Interest words

In Group 8 we introduce two letters (graphemes) which make a new sound (phoneme) when together, ch, sh, th and ng.

In most cases these words are very regular, here are some words which may require some extra attention.

wash: the A in wash is pronounced as short /o/, like in want, water.

push: the U in push is pronounced as /oo/, like in put and pull.

bath & path: the A in both words bath and path is pronounced as /ar/

th has two sounds, voiced like in that, them, then and unvoiced like in with, thick.
